## Sticky Knowledge

- Divali is the 'festival of lights' and is celebrated in late autumn.
- Hindus celebrate the triumph of light over darkness at Divali with spectacular firework displays, presents and new clothes.
- The word Divali means "Row of Lighted Lamps".

Divali takes place every year and it lasts for 5 days.

The exact dates of Divali depend on the position of the moon but it is usually celebrated during October and November.
