



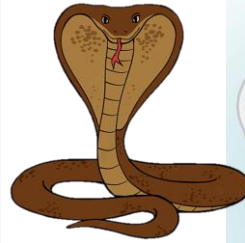
# Year 5 Religious Education: Sikhism

## Are Sikh stories important today?



### Key Vocabulary

<b>Guru Granth Sahib</b>	Sikh holy book and the 'eternal teacher'.
<b>Gurdwara</b>	Sikh place of worship where everyone sits to pray and eat.
<b>Vaisakhi</b>	Sikh festival marking the beginning of the harvest season and birth of the Khalsa order.
<b>Guru</b>	Punjabi word meaning teacher. Sikhs treat the Guru Granth Sahib as their most important teacher, or guru.
<b>Guru Nanak</b>	The founder of the Sikh faith.
<b>Guru Gobind Singh</b>	The final human Guru; he created the Khalsa. He said there would be more human gurus after him.
<b>Ik Onkar</b>	Every copy of the Guru Granth Sahib begins with this sign – there is only one God.
<b>Bhai Lalo</b>	A poor, honest carpenter.
<b>Malik Bhago</b>	A rich man whose wealth was gained by cheating the poor.
<b>Khalsa</b>	The word 'khalsa' means 'pure'. Joining the Khalsa order is a sign of commitment in Sikhism.

- ❑ They show it great respect as they believe it is the Sikh's last Guru (great teacher).
